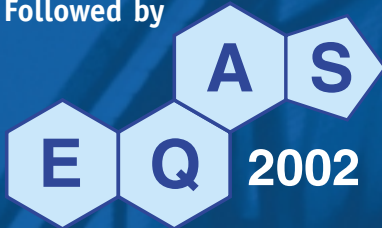

## Introduction

Flushed with the success of being awarded the European Laboratory Medicine Meeting in 2005, Glasgow hosts its fourth Focus Meeting of the modern era in May 2002. I have been involved in all the meetings over the last 12 years and we have gone from strength to strength through a process of innovation.

Focus 2002 is no exception. As the meetings evolve in response to an ever-changing environment, external factors dictate that we have a shorter meeting and we will lose one session by starting on Tuesday lunchtime.

However, following the example of European and International meetings we have full involvement of some of our Corporate Members in the Scientific Programme as Commercial Partners. Five of these have produced their own symposia, superb science in addition to our own scientific programme. The delegate will now have the choice of 3 parallel sessions most days, a 30% increase overall. With an expanded lunch break there is still adequate time to reflect and work through the implications of progress with our exhibitors.

### Scientific Programme

We have a large proportion of speakers from outwith the UK, which will also broaden the appeal. The Scientific Organising Committee looks forward to welcoming you to Glasgow.

**Workshops** (08.00-08.45 and 12.00-12.45) These sessions bring together groups of people with similar interests and problems, under the stewardship of an experienced convenor. We have arranged some as Morning Workshops and have complemented the programme with some Afternoon Workshops to cater for those who may be travelling daily to the meeting.

**Reviews** (08.00-08.45 and 12.00-12.45) Slightly more structured than workshops, the Review Sessions have proved popular with those wishing to gain knowledge of specialised areas of Clinical Biochemistry. They are conducted in a tutorial type forum.

**Oral Presentations.** There will be 2 sessions for Oral Presentations. Any delegate can submit posters for consideration as Oral Presentations. In addition, there will be the Bayer Award for which abstracts from ACB Members under the age of 35 years will be considered.

**Poster Sessions.** Posters will be displayed by category on two full-day sessions. Specialised Poster Topics will be arranged to coincide with the relevant scientific programme days. Presenting authors will be required to be in attendance at their posters between 17.00 and 17.30 on the day of display. DPC will award two bursaries for posters of analytical importance for the authors to continue their research.

All poster abstracts will be refereed anonymously.

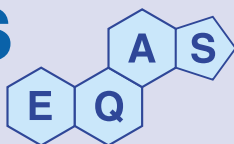
## Published Abstracts

## UK NEQAS Meeting



The UK NEQAS for endocrinology Participants' Meetings were initiated by Dr Graham Groom in the early 1980s, during his time as Organiser of the UK NEQAS for Steroid Hormones. They were continued by his successor, Dr Jonathan Middle, as a major two-yearly, four-day scientific meeting and trade exhibition attracting up to 400 delegates. The organising association became a Registered UK Charity (1016114) in January 1993 to emphasise the not-for-profit status and primary educational objectives of the meetings, mirroring the stance of UK NEQAS itself.

EQAS'90 and EQAS'92 were held in Cardiff, but for EQAS'94, the meeting moved to Edinburgh. Such was the success of this venue that subsequent meetings (EQAS '96 and EQAS '98) alternated between the two cities. For 2000, the usual meeting was suspended in order to collaborate as a full partner in Pathology 2000. For 2002, rather than hold a separate meeting in Edinburgh at a similar time to Focus 2002 in Glasgow, the meetings have been combined for mutual support and benefit.

EQAS2002 will address day-to-day issues of practical importance to all laboratory staff, including analytical performance and clinical application of tests in the fields of endocrinology and oncology. It will also provide an opportunity for delegates to meet Scheme Organisers and Managers and to discuss matters of common interest.

EQAS2002 will open on the morning of Friday 24th May 2002 with a meeting of the Steroid Accuracy Forum (see [www.ukneqas.org.uk/saf01.htm](http://www.ukneqas.org.uk/saf01.htm)) and to enable delegates to visit the Focus Trade Exhibition. This will be followed by three half-day sessions focusing on steroid, thyroid, peptide hormones and tumour markers, reflecting the work of the UK NEQAS centres involved. A social event is planned for the Friday evening.

Each session will comprise keynote lectures, UK NEQAS highlights and discussion periods. In order for the topics to be as current and relevant as possible, the final programme will be developed over the coming months. Regular updates will be posted at [www.ukneqas.org.uk/eqas2002.htm](http://www.ukneqas.org.uk/eqas2002.htm), in ACB News and in Scheme reports.

All types and grade of staff from laboratories and diagnostics manufacturers are warmly invited to attend EQAS2002, irrespective of whether they are UK NEQAS participants or ACB members.

## Guidelines for registration

Individual registrations can be made on line via [www.focus-acb.org](http://www.focus-acb.org) and payment may be made by credit card submitted over a secure internet site. Alternatively, the form in this brochure can be used for individual delegates (**not to be used for Corporate bookings**).

**Focus Resident Packages include:** Admission to the Scientific Programme and Exhibition, entitlement to book for Workshops, Reviews and Management/Update Sessions, coffee, tea, lunch, on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, plus accommodation with breakfast for nights of Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, in hotel level selected (De Luxe, Standard or Budget), social programme including evening meals as indicated and the Conference Banquet. Single and shared rooms are available in De Luxe and Standard hotels, and single rooms only in budget accommodation.

## Guidelines for poster abstracts

Abstracts should be received on or before **18th January 2002**. All presenting authors **must register as delegates** for Focus 2002 or EQAS 2002, as appropriate.

The preferred method of submission is electronically via the web site [www.focus-acb.org](http://www.focus-acb.org) (please only submit abstracts once, in case of difficulties please telephone +44 (0) 1 223 404830.)

Alternatively, you can submit your typed abstract on the form to Focus 2002, PO Box 409, Cambridge CB1 4QD. Faxed submissions will not be accepted.

The title must not exceed 20 words and the text should be no more than 200 words. Figures and tables should not be included in the abstract.

Abstracts must:

- State the specific aim of the study.
- State methods used, if pertinent.
- Summarise results obtained.
- State conclusions reached.

Statements such as 'data will be presented' or 'results will be discussed' may lead to rejection.

**You must select one topic code from the list below.**

**If your abstract is for EQAS 2002 choose the topic code EQA.**

**All authors must confirm that the abstract has been reviewed by their Head of Department prior to submission.**

All submitted abstracts will be reviewed by the Scientific Programme Organising Committee whose decision is final. Authors will be notified of acceptance by **8th March 2002**. Detailed instructions on oral and poster presentations will be sent out with acceptance letters. Abstracts will be published in the Proceedings of the National Meeting of the Association of Clinical Biochemists. Abstracts for EQAS 2002 will appear only in the EQAS Proceedings.

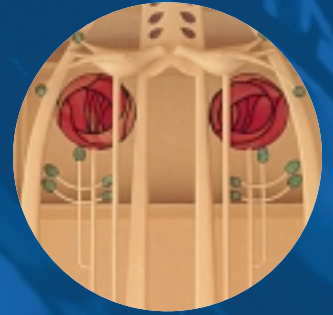
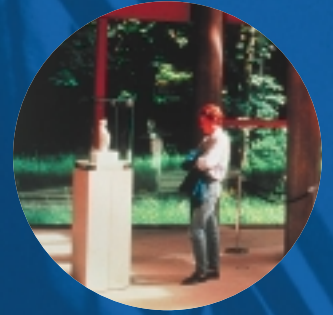
